and possible travel opportunities we should also make sure that our dive equipment is all in good order and our skills are refreshed. If you diving equipment has not had its annual check up, get that in the works. Diventures in Lexington, Kentucky can service Scuba Pro equipment in house and send other equipment to another shop. If you have a favorite shop, then get your equipment to them now.

The club is planning for some pool refresher dive training. Be on the lookout in the near future for this opportunity to refresh you skills. Rust and corrosion do not belong on or in either our equipment or our divers.

Insurance for Dive Accidents & Travel

DAN (Divers Alert Network) is a go to organization that most of us as divers know about, use and support. The DAN resources are incredibly helpful and their membership used to include basic dive accident insurance. Be aware that several years ago DAN changed their membership model and made any dive accident insurance an additional

purchase option. Formerly the DAN dive accident insurance was included with your membership. Now it is an optional and additional purchase.

Dive Assure is an alternative and longtime provider of both Dive and Travel Insurance. The Bluegrass Dive Club also has an affiliation with Dive Assure and receives a commission on any purchases made using our weblink:

Dive Assure offers member benefits in addition to the insurance benefits which can be quite helpful. There are other insurers that offer dive accident coverage and many that offer travel insurance. Just be sure you know what is actually covered.

We will not go into detail on the various differences in types of policies and coverages in this article. We will explain a few terms and policy details that you should be aware of as you shop for coverage.

Always find the Description Of Coverage (DOC) document and use it for detailed reference. This is the document often found described as "Terms and Conditions", "Handbook", and "Plan Details" after you begin the request for a quote process.

The DOC and the Plan Coverage page are the legally binding document that describes the insurance coverages. In the United States, each state must approve and allow the insurer to sell insurance in their state. Coverage you shop for may not be the same as someone else's depending upon your state of residence. It is important to be aware of the following terms and there definition in any policy you are considering for purchase:

Dive Accident Insurance vs. Travel Insurance that includes diving and watersports accident coverage

- ✓ Trip (defined dates) vs. Annual coverage
- ✓ Plan Coverage or Limits
- ✓ What is Covered vs. What is Excluded
- ✓ Primary vs. Secondary Coverage
- Definition of a Trip (or where coverage is afforded under the policy). Some say 50, 100, or 150 miles from home while others may require you to have traveled out of the country to be covered.

Insurance can make the financial burden and arrangements for dealing with the unexpected much easier. Out of personal experience in 2017, a prescribed treatment for DCS with the US Navy Table 6 (5 hours) in the hyperbaric chamber will set you back a cool \$5,000.00 with payment arranged before treatment begins.

If you need a low altitude evacuation flight due to medical emergency, it gets very expensive very fast. Your claim can easily jet right through \$100,000.00.

Equipment check, Skills check, Dive and/or Travel Insurance check,

Safety Information Director

Safety From This SAFETY BITE

My mission is to provide you relevant safety information for your use. Each article will be a bite size portion of a specific safety risk. I will draw from my experience, hopefully yours, and the dive community to highlight real risks that we must be aware of. So, if you see or hear of something that we could all learn from, please pass it to me. There is nothing like firsthand experience to drive a point home. This month's **SAFETY BITE** is:

Broke Fin or Mask Strap

Having your fin or mask strap break during a dive is a real safety risk. At best it is a distracting consuming problem that must be remedied and at worst it is a serious emergency. Anything that requires an **abort dive decision** must be prevented from happening if at all possible.

Back in the day, before the advent of modern silicone materials, broken fin and mask straps were not that uncommon. Everyone watched their straps closely and carried spares. I recall a training lesson in the pool for a broken fin strap and loss of a fin where you crossed your feet and porpoise kicking with just one fin. While both straps are subject to aging deterioration and wear and tear, fin straps take more stress and are more likely to fail. I have personally experienced and seen fin straps fail during a dive and it is a show stopper. If you are in any kind of challenging situation that requires two hands and/or two legs, like a moderate current, you may lose or have to give up that fin and abort the dive. The purpose of this SAFETY BITE is how to avoid broken straps.

Avoiding broken fin and mask straps comes down simply to inspection and testing

periodically, especially if your equipment has been in service for a while. And not just the strap condition but also the latching and adjustment mechanism condition and function. Best to remove the straps first. Inspect for any damage- abrasions, cuts, tears, and material loss. Inspect for age deterioration- change in color or texture, loss of flexibility or stretch, and deformation of the material. Now, give them a good pull and stretch test. Look at them closely while pulling and stretching to see any wear or tear. Reassemble and examine the condition and function of the latching and adjustment parts. These plastic parts also fail from repeated use and age.

Finally, replace or upgrade your straps and/or latches if you find any defects. There are good online videos on how to do this or take your equipment to the dive shop and have them do it.

Well, that's our little **SAFETY BITE.** I hope everyone savors and benefits from it. Cheers, Bart ►
