Board Meeting Highlights -

June 2025

Meeting Summary

The June Board meeting covered travel planning, officer recruitment, financial updates, trip logistics, and club operations. The team evaluated the We Travel software platform to potentially streamline trip planning and payments. A representative will present the platform at the July meeting. The group also discussed promoting the Dale Hollow trip scheduled for July 26th and confirmed upcoming travel agent presentations.

Key Discussion Highlights

Travel planning software 'We Travel' will be presented at the July meeting to explore its potential benefits for the club.

The club is organizing a Dale Hollow trip on July 26th, led by John Geddes, with a pontoon boat rental covered by donated dive bucks and individual gas contributions.

The Cozumel trip currently has 8 participants; with a firm sign-up deadline of September 15th for the October 25th to November 1st trip.

Bart shared recommendations for Indonesia diving trips and is gathering more details for the club.

Future destinations under consideration include the Azores,

though the Red Sea was ruled out due to safety concerns.

Officer recruitment was discussed, with potential candidates for upcoming positions.

Financial Updates

The board reviewed financial reports, confirming a bank balance of \$25,026.09 with no outstanding checks or deposits. Trip refunds for Fort Young Dominica were completed, and adjustments were made to trip admin fees for Cozumel and Little Cayman. Invoices for Cozumel cancellations will be issued. The board discussed continued management of club expenses and trip-related financials.

Planning Ahead

Promote the Dale Hollow trip and secure participant commitments by July 8th.

Schedule and prepare presentations for the July meeting, including the We Travel software demonstration and travel agent overview.

Coordinate upcoming trips to Compass Point, Grand Cayman, Little Cayman, and Cozumel.

Continue officer recruitment and succession planning for key roles within the club.

Gather additional information on liveaboard trips in Indonesia and other recommended destinations. ►

Safety Information Director

I Got a Taste of Diving Safety from This SAFETY BITE

My mission is to provide you relevant safety information for your use. Each article will be a bite size portion of a specific safety risk. I will draw from my experience, hopefully yours, and the dive community to highlight real risks that we must be aware of. So, if you see or hear of something that we could all learn from, please pass it to me. There is nothing like first-hand experience to drive a point home. This month's **SAFETY BITE** is:

CONTAMINATED AIR IN YOUR TANK

Note from Bart: In my nearly 50 years of scuba diving, I have never experienced this and I never want to again. On a recent family vacation to Costa Rica, I made 4 boat dives over two days with my daughter Jolene. We used one of the best known and highly recommended dive shops in the area.

On the last dive, the air tasted terrible of some kind of oil or gas contamination. I didn't notice it until I hit the water. Being a large number of we had quickly descended as divers. instructed in order to group up. I thought about aborting the dive but did not. Instead, I elected to continue and closely monitor how I was feeling. I felt no nausea or headache and my breathing was fine although I found myself taking shorter breaths. It was foul and repulsive. I was certainly distracted, and could not focus on anything else. A very unpleasant dive and experience that could not end fast enough. Jolene said her air was fine but a couple other divers also said their air tasted

bad. I meant to bring it up to the boat crew but in the hustle to get all our gear together and then into the inflatable to drop us off on the beach to catch our van, I didn't have time to. Later that day, I texted the owner of the shop and he immediately responded with much seriousness that I appreciated. He really wished I had told the crew and had the tank flagged as that would have greatly assisted their investigation. The other divers also had not said anything and hearing that it was not just me he said their compressor operation was being shut down and a full process examination. and testina underway to find and resolve the source of contamination. He said they have a rigorous air sampling quality control program but obviously this did not catch the problem and that was another issue that had to be investigated. The owner and I continued to communicate and I was impressed and confident in his response.

In hindsight, I realized that because the air was so bad that I was constantly distracted, this was an unsafe situation and I should have aborted the dive. Here is some information from DAN and other legitimate sources on the subject.

Breathing Gas Contamination

Health effects on divers vary depending on the contaminant. The most severe symptoms of breathing contaminated gas are impaired judgment/confusion and loss of consciousness, both of which may be deadly underwater. Other symptoms such as nausea, headache, dizziness, and breathing difficulties can also result in an unsafe situation and warrant aborting the dive.

Identifying contamination cases based on symptoms alone can prove difficult. The symptoms are often vague and are similar to other illnesses. If divers suspect exposure to bad breathing gas is causing their symptoms, they should seek a medical evaluation and have the gas in their tank analyzed.

Symptoms need to be evaluated in the context of the dive exposure. Typically, a group of divers will have their tanks filled from the same source. Monitoring fellow divers who had their tank filled by the same source can help determine whether symptoms are related to gas contamination.

Sources of contamination vary, but include impurities existing in the surrounding environment (engine exhaust, carbon dioxide, dust particles) and/or by-products of the hot compression process (carbon monoxide or hydrocarbons from compressor lubricants- oils and greases). Failure of compressor air filtration is also a possibility.

Recommendations:

- Get air fills from a reputable dive shop or club.
- Conduct a predive gas breathing taste check. If your breathing gas has an unusual odor or taste, do not dive with it.
- THIS IS GOING ON MY DIVE CHECKLIST.
- Immediately, pre or post dive, bring any suspected contaminated tank to the attention of the crew or staff
